Native Plants Support Fruits and Vegetables in Your Garden: **Build a Year-Round Ecosystem to Improve Your Harvest**

Establishing and maintaining patches or strips of native grasses and wildflowers near your garden will attract, support, and sustain a beneficial ecosystem. This ecosystem will improve plant health. Many species of bees needed for vegetable and fruit pollination nest and/or overwinter in the ground or in the stems of native plants. Plantings that provide bees with floral resources and year-round cover will result in healthier, on-site populations of bees available for pollination. Native plants also provide resources to beneficial insects, including predatory wasps, parasitoid wasps, ground beetles, lady beetles, soldier beetles, lacewings, etc. all of which help naturally control pest insects that are detrimental to your vegetable and fruit plants.



North Clackamas Celebrates Opening of BFG Pollinator Gardens in their Parks and Recreation District

Parks, gardens, and greenspaces have become increasingly important to supporting the vitality of diverse pollinator species. North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District (NCPRD) is supporting local pollinators by planting native flowering plant species in parks and natural areas. Native plants are best adapted to the climate and soil conditions of a specific region, often making them more drought tolerant and low-maintenance. These plants have evolved to develop a mutually beneficial relationship with local wildlife and pollinators, and are the heart of a pollinator-friendly garden. NCPRD, in partnered efforts with Pollinator Partnership, have established 3 unique pollinator parks within Clackamas County, Oregon at Alma Myra Park, Hawthorne Park, and Stringfield Family Park.
