- 8:45 am 9:45 am Session #1: Black Bears of NY Seth Liddle. Seth will be explaining the natural history, biology, and management of black bears and how people can avoid conflicts with them.

Seth Liddle is a Region 4 Fish and Wildlife Technician with the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation. He is responsible for addressing nuisance wildlife issues and assisting with general wildlife management in Albany and Schenectady County. He has worked on various projects that includes work with hellbenders, timber rattlesnakes, furbearers, waterfowl and upland game birds across many wildlife management areas in Region 4. He holds an Associates degree in Fisheries and Wildlife Technology from SUNY Cobleskill.

9:45 am - 10:45 am Session #2: Planting for Pollinators – Lacey Smith. Lacey will discuss Pollinators provide vital ecosystem services and food security. Unfortunately, pollinators are in decline and face many challenges, such as pressure from invasive species and habitat loss. Lacey will share information on how to support native pollinators and the NRCS programs that benefit pollinators in woodlands. Lacey will also share information on native trees and shrubs that are highly beneficial to native pollinators.

Lacey Smith is the Northeast Regional Partner Biologist with Pollinator Partnership (P2). She works in joint capacity with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to promote, coordinate, and implement conservation efforts that relate to pollinator conservation on private lands. Lacey also provides pollinator related educational outreach and training to NRCS staff, producers, partners, and landowners. Lacey has a BA in Environmental Geoscience and MS in Forestry from West Virginia University.

The section is responsible for private forestry programs, including 480-a and Regenerate NY, to assist private forest landowners in sustainably managing their forest resource for the long term. Prior to holding this position, Jason was a private and public lands forester working out of the DEC office in Stamford, NY.

Nick Jensen is a Wealth Advisor with Mercer Advisors in Rochester, NY. He is a Certified Public Accountant and a Certified Financial Planner. Bob is the Chief Executive Officer of the Winnakee Land Trust, a not-for-profit organization specializing in the long-term protection and stewardship of private forest lands in New York State. Bob brings a forester's perspective to the land trust community and translates the importance of active stewardship and sustainable forest management to traditional land conservation. He has over 35 years of experience in government, consulting, academia, and now non-profit land protection and stewardship, and brings a unique perspective on the conservation of Family Forest Lands. He is the former Director of Forest Properties at the SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry responsible for the management of 26,000 acres of forest land; former principal of Forestry Advisors, LLC consulting firm; and began his career in the Hudson Valley as a NYSDEC Forester. He has BS in Forest Resource Management and MS in Forest Ecosystem Science from SUNY ESF.

3:00 pm - 5:00 pm Option 2#: Woods Walk – Tour of the grounds of Olana State Historic Site. Once the home of well-known painter, world traveler, self-taught architect, farmer, and landscape designer Fredric Church, Olana overlooks the Hudson River. The 250-acre naturalistic landscape is considered one of Frederic Church's greatest works of art and is one of the most intact artist-designed landscapes in the United States. This composition included a working and ornamental farm, meadows, an artificial lake, native woodlands, and five miles of carriage roads. The mission of the Olana Partnership is to inspire the public by preserving and interpreting Frederic Church's Olana.
